## **Ethnicity and Urbanization**


**Project Objective:** The goal of this project is to understand the ethnic diversity of Greenville County and relate it to the geographical space with respect to the urban centers within the county. One observation-driven hypothesis is that the white population represented in U.S. Census block groups increases as distance from the City of Greenville increases.

**Methods:** First, I had to define my parameters for distance. I decided to measure the ethnic make-up of the population of block groups within Greenville City, those 0-2km, 2-4km, 4-8km, 8-12km, 12-16km, and 16km or greater from Greenville City. Since the block groups did not match the city limits in shape, I defined the block groups to make up Greenville City as those that are either contained within the city limits or have a portion of the group boundary touching the Greenville city limits. Then, using 2000 U.S. Census data, I recorded the totals for each of the eight ethnic definitions used by the census (White, Black, Hispanic, Asian, Hawaiian Islander/Pacific Islander, American Eskimo, Multi-Race, and Other). I also recorded the proportion of each ethnicity for each block group.

I placed these values in a spreadsheet and performed a Chi-Squared Test of Independence. My null hypothesis is that there is no relationship between race and distance from Greenville City. With 42 degrees of freedom, I was able to reject my null hypothesis at the 0.01 level of confidence (X²= 21520.241, which is greater than the critical value of 63.691). This implies that there is a relationship between ethnicity and distance from Greenville City.

**Conclusion:** This study concludes that there is a significant relationship between the distance of the U.S. Census block group from Greenville City and the proportion of that block group that is white. The proportion of white citizens in the block groups increases with distance from the city. Conversely, the minority population of these same block groups must decrease as distance from the city increases.
